

A Comprehensive Plan is...

- √ A vision or blueprint for the future for the next 10 to 20 years
- The townspeople taking charge of their future
- √ A way to control town costs and increases in property taxes associated with growth
- A way to access grant money, such as for recreational facilities, housing rehabilitation, or addressing threats to the water quality of our lakes
- √ A practical guide to managing growth and directing public policy
- √ A legal foundation for amendments to local regulations that may be voted upon by the town at a later date

A Comprehensive Plan is COMPREHENSIVE

It addresses all aspects - population growth and changes, housing, recreation, economy, land use, open space, natural and cultural resources, fiscal capacity, transportation and community facilities and services.

Why Are We Updating The Comprehensive Plan Now?


- The town's comprehensive plan is over 20 years old, things have changed
- Central Maine is growing again, especially rural towns like Vienna and its neighbors
- People from away are moving to town bringing new expectations; we need to be prepared
- We need to control the costs of growth and development so that property taxes do not get out of hand

How Is The Plan Being Updated?


The town raised funds at the past several town meetings and obtained a grant from the Maine State Planning Office so that it could hire a consultant to assist in the planning effort. The Selectpersons appointed a Comprehensive Plan Committee and hired Gwen Hilton (Starks/Madison) to develop the Plan. These folks will be working on the Plan during the coming year, and expect to have the Plan voted on at the 2008 Town Meeting.

What Are We Learning?

- Vienna's population is projected to increase to 676 individuals by the year 2020¹. Vienna and its neighbors will experiencefaster rates of growth than countywide and statewide. As areas around Augusta and Farmingtonbecome more developed, Vienna will become increasingly attractive as a place to live.
- In-migration will be the driving force in population growth. The year-round population is about 570 individuals.
 Population growthbetween 1990 and 2004 was primarily the result of people moving here (134 people) as opposed to people being born here (16 people).



• Vienna will have an overall older population in the future. The number of people age 45 to 65 will continue to grow much larger than the other age categories. The proportion of people age 65 and over will double in size by 2020. There will be a modest increase in the young adult age group (18 to 44), and very little change in the

under age 18 category.

- Vienna's seasonal population is expected to increase considerably over the next ten years. The population nearly triples in the summer due to the large number of seasonal and second homes and day trip recreational opportunities.
- Housing growth rates for Vienna and surrounding towns outpaces growth rates countywide and state wide during the 1990s. Vienna experienced an increaseof 56 housing units during the 1990s. The largest increases in the number of units for area towns occured in Rome (162 units) and Chesterville (149 units).
- Vienna's neighbors² will experience greater rates of housing growth than Vienna over the next decade, but as areas develop there will be increasing pressure on Vienna as a location for rural housing.
- Housing is becoming less and less affordable in the region as a result of the demands for high value shorefront properties, second homes, and homes for more affluent newcomers.
- Seniors, young families and middle and low income households may have a harder time finding affordable housing in town in the future.
- Vienna has much economic strength to build upon:
 - The town will continue to be a bedroom community to area service and employment center communities, where there is a wide

range of employment opportunities.

- √ There is a very active local economy consisting of a variety of over 60 small businesses and home occupations.
- √ There is an outstanding natural resource base with land sutiable for small-scale farming and forestry, and an attractive rural landscape, which includes the Highlands Preserve and a number of lakes and scenic vistas suitable for recreation-based businesses.
