SELECTMEN'S MINUTES JUNE- JULY

June 3, 2014

Present : Dodi Thompson, Chris Smith, Jeff Rackliff, Brian Church, Marti Gross

1. Reviewed and dispersed mail.
2. Read and accepted minutes.
3. Reviewed and signed warrant #12 (\$69,154.50)
4. Fire Chief Church updated the Selectmen on the restoration of the Forestry Truck. The new pump and polly tank are on the truck. The under carriage has been undercoated. The paint on the truck has been buffed. The Vienna Fire Department will use the forestry truck to respond to car accidents in the winter. It has four wheel drive and will be equipped with 300 gallons of water along with other equipment needed for car accidents. The restoration of the Forestry Truck has added another truck to the

fleet which will help save the more expensive equipment and help extend the life of the two large firetrucks. The Forestry Truck should be ready for service by the end of June.

Chief Church discussed with the Selectmen the possibility of adding a bay onto the left side of the Fire Department. The Fire Department feels this is needed in order to properly house the Forestry Truck as it will be holding water. This will prevent the water from freezing. Currently the Forestry Truck is removed from service, drained of water and stored outside the Fire Station for the winter season. Chief Church will talk with the planning board and get estimates for the construction of the third bay. The selectmen requested the department get three bids. The selectmen will review the cost at that time and discuss placing an article in the 2015 Town

Meeting Warrant.

- 5. The Fire Department is planning the annual Chicken BBQ for Sunday, July 27.
- 6. Chief Church discussed the number and type of calls the fire department has responded to recently – locally and through Mutual Aid.
- 7. The Community room is in need of replacing several of its fold up tables. The tables are used for public suppers and other community events. The Vienna Fire Department, Inc. is willing to pay half the cost of the tables. The other half will come from the Community Building account. Chief Church will research the best price for the tables. He will get back to the selectmen with the cost.
- 8. The Town of Vienna has faxed and mailed the 2014 Homestead Exemption Report to the state. Our current valuation is still considered to be 100% for exemptions.
- 9. The Selectmen signed an abatement for property that the Homestead Exemption was removed in error.
- 10. The Selectmen discussed foreclosed properties and agreed to get a list together and to set a date for bids on the foreclosed properties for later in the year.

June 10, 2014

Present: Dodi Thompson, Chris Smith, Jeff Rackliff, Stephen Langsdorf, Jim Anderberg

- 1. Reviewed and dispersed mail.
- 2. Assessor John Sexton has made two onsite visits with property owners. In each case the current assessment for the buildings was reviewed and reduced. Selectment will grant abatements.
- 3. Executive Session: Selectmen, Board of Appeals chairman Jim Anderberg and Attorney Stephen Langsdorf of Preti-Flaherty in Augusta to discuss the fact that the Cell Tower company is appealing the Planning Board denial of their Cell Tower application.

Result: It has been established that the Town of Vienna does not have a legally authorized Board of Appeals – ours was established as an appointed committee around 1985 – by law it must be established by town charter or specific ordinance. Vienna has neither.

- 4. Selectmen voted to hire Attorney Langsdorf to represent the town in this matter. He will contact the CTC concerning their appeal. In the absence of a town Board Appeals, the next step is Superior Court.
- 5. Selectmen signed papers regarding Auditor Stephen Hopkins. He is working on the 2013 Town Audit.

June 17, 2014

- 1. Reviewed and dispersed mail.
- 2. Read and accepted minutes.
- 3. Reviewed and signed warrant #12 (\$116,687.50)
- 4. Chief Church reported that 70% of his budget has been spent. Almost \$5000.00 of this was in pump test, state inspection and repairs made to Engine 80 and 81. Chief Church went on to say that it has been 6 years since the Fire Department increased its budget and sees it needing to be increased this next year. At this time it looks as if \$5000.00 will need to be added to the Fire Department budget for the upcoming year. The Selectmen and Fire Chief will review this when the budget season begins. The Vienna Fire Department has a larger number of members and the department is conducting more training then in previous years. The forestry truck is almost finished waiting on two hose adapters. The Vienna Fire Department will be cleaning chimneys this fall, sign up sheets will be placed at the Vienna Post Office and Flying Pond Variety as time gets closer.

PLANNING BOARD NEWS

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE VIENNA PLANNING BOARD HELD MAY 28, 2014

Board of Appeals (BoA) and that the Planning Board should avoid discussing matters pertinent to that application in his presence.

The convened at 7:00 PM at the Town House; regular members present were Waine Whittier, Alan Williams, Ed Lawless, Austin Harrell, and Creston Gaither. Also present were Board of Appeals Chair Jim Anderberg and several Vienna citizens.

Sarah Simons said she believes that a Federal law requires towers to be at least 1500 feet from schools and residences etc. She will try to find documentation of this and forward it to the Board.

Creston had advertised this meeting as including a public hearing on proposed changes to the Town's Wireless Telecommunications Facilities Siting Ordinance.

Options for new setback requirements were discussed. The Board formally agreed that a 1000 foot setback from any residence, school, or other public building where meetings are held would be ideal, unless an easement allowing a smaller setback is first obtained. It was suggested that Sect. 7.2.K.1.f. be deleted.

With regard to the Board's recent determination regarding Dean Sciaraffa's permit application (see April 23 minutes) it was noted that it was ultimately determined that the proposed construction site does not lie within a flood hazard zone as shown on FEMA's FIRM. A corrected copy of Waine's May 13 letter to attorney Andrew Hamilton was signed.

Jim suggested that the provisions for appeals be clarified as to whether the BoA does a de novo or appellate review, in which it would simply review and rule on prior decisions by the Planning Board. Waine will discuss the wording of such a provision with M.M.A.

The Board then began the public hearing regarding the aforesaid "cell tower" ordinance. Waine outlined the Board's concerns with the setback waiver provisions of the Ordinance. The existing requirements of the Ordinance regarding setback provisions were outlined.

Jim asked whether the Ordinance does or should provide for some parties to have formal "intervener status." It was agreed that the Board should take its time to carefully draft proposed changes and then have a special town meeting to adopt them.

Alan presented proposed wording for a change to the Ordinance which would eliminate its waiver provision. Waine outlined the existing "exemption provisions" which the Board suggests be eliminated from the Ordinance.

A Letter of Map Amendment forwarded by FEMA removing the structure at 103 Town House Road from the flood zone was briefly reviewed.

The meeting adjourned at 8:00 PM.

**MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING
OF THE VIENNA
PLANNING BOARD HELD JUNE 25, 2014**

The meeting convened at 7:00 PM at the Town House; regular members present were Waine Whittier, Ed Lawless, Austin Harrell, and Creston Gaither. Minutes of the May 28 meeting were read and accepted.

Waine has discussed the difference between "de novo" & "appellate" reviews (see May 28 minutes) with attorney Richard Flewelling at MMA and provided copies of a letter from Mr. Flewelling suggesting that the Board of Appeals be limited to appellate reviews. It was agreed that the "cell tower Ordinance" should be revised to provide for this. Mr. Flewelling also recommended against having the Ordinance allow for "intervenor status" (see May 28 minutes) because to allow this would be inconsistent with Vienna's general approach to this type of regulation.

Waine will work on a proposed draft for the revisions to the Ordinance. He may draft separate articles for different revisions so they could be voted on separately.

The Board briefly reviewed e-mails dated June 25 from Wendy Rackliff regarding her proposal to place fill on her Day Road property known as tax map 3 lot 32-K. Field notes from the Board's Sept. 17 site visit to this parcel were briefly reviewed. Shoreland Zoning Ordinance Sect. 15. G, was reviewed. Concerns were raised regarding both the proposed size of the parking area and runoff control and whether the extent of proposed fill is to exceed 10 CY.

Creston will relay these concerns to Mrs. Rackliff and seek additional information.

The meeting adjourned at 7:45 PM.

FROM THE HEALTH OFFICER

**"Bee" Stings
7/19/2014**

Not all "bee stings" are from real bees. Here in Maine, probably more stings are by yellow jackets, which are actually a type of ground-dwelling wasp and the most aggressive of local stinging insects. Since summer and fall are when most stings happen, I'll review for you how to avoid, evaluate, and treat stings when they happen to you or a family member.

Stings by bees (honey bees and bumble bees; insect order Hymenoptera, family Apidae) and wasps (yellow jackets, wasps, and hornets; insect order Hymenoptera, family Vespidae) are interesting. The stinger is a modified "ovipositor", the female's egg-laying organ; hence all these stinging pests are female. Stinging is used for both defense, and in the case of wasps, for prey immobilization as well. Honeybees deliver the most venom per sting, but make up for it by being less aggressive than yellow jackets, wasps, and hornets, which often inflict many more stings when they attack us in swarms.



Venom contains vasoactive amines including histamine and dopamine along with norepinephrine and kinins, which account for the painful red swelling and itching at the sting site, with swelling over 4 inches in diameter classified as "large"; sometimes raised, itchy rashes, called


hives (medically: “urticaria”), occur over larger areas, distant from the sting site. Venom also contains protein enzymes, which contribute to local victim cell breakdown and pain but can also sensitize (make allergic) a person so that subsequent stings, weeks to years later, can result in potentially fatal hypersensitivity reactions (anaphylaxis) in 3% of adults and less than 1% of children. In other words, the human body can become its own worst enemy by releasing massive amounts of vasoactive amines in response to stings. This response causes shock (dangerously low blood pressure) and/or airway obstruction (severe asthma, swollen throat).

Small comfort though it is, sensitization to bee stings does not cause sensitization to wasp stings. But that’s not a lot of help because we can rarely choose or know whether we’re being stung by one insect family or the other. The size of a local reaction does not correlate well with later systemic hypersensitivity reactions; so don’t panic if your sting swelling has a 5-inch diameter, unless it is in your mouth (common with yellow jackets, which often feed on sugary foods/drinks). Once a person has had an allergic reaction, then they are highly likely to have another if stung by the same family of insects.

Local treatment for a sting for all should include a rapid search for a honeybee stinger (the size of a very small tick), which continues to pump venom for 20-30 seconds into the wound even after the bee has been brushed off. Look immediately and if found, scrape it off fast with a credit card or fingernail. Cold packs, antihistamines (25 -50 mg of diphenhydramine (like Benadryl) every 6 hrs; half that in toddlers or small children), and aspirin can help the pain/itching. It may be reasonable to also get an EpiPen (prescription injectable epinephrine, at least 2 doses of 0.3mg in adults; these can be injected through clothing) or other form of injectable epinephrine to have around in case a future sting causes shock or respiratory symptoms.

Although most stings are inconsequential, some are serious and kill 40 or more people a year in the US. Two young acquaintances of mine here in Central Maine have died that way, both probably from yellow jackets. Any signs of allergic hypersensitivity reactions manifest by low blood pressure and/or shortness of breath should be immediately evaluated in an emergency room. After an anaphylactic

reaction, even a mild one, a person should assiduously avoid places of likely contact with stinging insects; don’t keep bees and don’t mow lawns, drink soft drink cans outside, or pick raspberries where yellow jackets hang out. They should also carry at least two doses of some form of injectable epinephrine as described above, which is truly live-saving. Given the potentially fatal consequences of developing anaphylaxis, patients who have survived a systemic allergic reaction should also be medically skin tested and desensitized with multiple injections of small amounts of venom over months-years. And, because they worsen an already bad situation, stopping chronic blood pressure medicines especially beta-blockers (like atenolol) and ACE inhibitors (like lisinopril and enalapril) should be considered.



I hope I haven't scared you too much. Most stings are just a bother but a very small percent of people can die from them. I hope following the above guidelines can help you and yours be safe and enjoy the summer.




Seeking Help!

You can sign up on line at redcrossblood.org; call 1-800-RED CROSS or locally, call Libby at 293-2362. Because of limited space, it is strongly suggested that you make an apt before coming. Everyone who donates will receive a \$2.50 coupon for Turkey Hill Ice Cream.

The Red Cross supplies blood to 39 Maine hospitals. Because of the severe winter weather, blood supplies in Maine are down and approaching a critical shortage. 20% of the Maine blood supply comes from students. With students out of school for the summer, it becomes a difficult collection time. The whole process takes about an hour although the actual giving of blood is only 8 – 10 minutes.



The gift of time, and blood, is a precious thing in our busy lives. Please take an hour and help us meet our goal of 24 pints. **All blood types are needed** but especially O neg, B neg and A neg. Be sure to drink plenty of water before coming and try to eat foods rich in iron. One form of

identification will be

needed. While you're in "downtown" Vienna waiting to donate, check out the Vienna Historical Society's 3rd annual Antique Fair and Flea Market and the Villages Farmers Market, both will be set up between the historical Society and the Grange on Rt 41 within walking distance of the Fire Dept.

Call for VOLUNTEERS - Invasive Plant Patrol (IPP)

With the threat of invasive aquatic plants increasing in our area, the need to pay attention to the plants growing in our lakes is greater than ever. The Invasive Plant Patrol (IPP) is a program to detect invasions early and be prepared to implement a rapid response. Teams of trained volunteers survey the lakes, usually by boat, looking for invasive plants. It takes many volunteers to completely survey a lake and the

teams on Parker and Flying are looking for new people to join them. These trained volunteers will work with you, so no prior experience is necessary to get started, only a concern to protect our lakes. Please contact us if you are interested. Survey work will take place in August and early September.

Courtesy Boat Inspectors at Flying and Parker Ponds

It's been an active summer for boaters on our lakes! In June and July our courtesy boat inspectors conducted over 500 inspections at the Parker Pond and Flying Pond launches, looking for hitchhiking plants. Boat inspections are critical to help prevent the spread of invasive plants into our lakes. With a busy August ahead of us, we still need a few more volunteers to join us in this effort, especially on Saturday and Sunday mornings. Training is easy and doesn't require expertise. 
