### MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE VIENNA PLANNING BOARD

November 24, 2021

The meeting convened at 7:00 PM at the Town House. Regular members present were Waine Whittier, Alan Williams, Creston Gaither, Tim Bickford, and Ed Lawless. Minutes of the Board's October 27 meeting were read and accepted.

Ed updated the Board on the status of the ongoing broadband effort. He said that Fayette has signed a separate contract for broadband service but has not formally left the group of towns working on broadband to which Vienna belongs.

Creston mentioned a citizen's suggestion that the Town enact an ordinance to control solar power developments. This was discussed informally; Creston agreed to investigate the similar efforts underway in other towns.


5 recent Notification of Construction permits were reviewed briefly.




Below are only two of the many impressive graphs I found there.



- Maine Med Assoc: New studies released last week by the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and another published by the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) showed that booster shots of COVID-19 vaccines provide robust protection against hospitalization and severe disease. One study showed that unvaccinated adults were 3-5 times more likely to get omicron infection. Unfortunately, some public health experts are concerned the news is coming late to the winter surge in coronavirus cases; people wanting shots has slowed, with more than 86 million people eligible for the additional shots not having gotten them.

Additional studies:

**COVID-19 Incidence and Death Rates Among Unvaccinated and Fully Vaccinated Adults with and Without Booster Doses During Periods of Delta and Omicron Variant Emergence** – (US CDC MMWR, Jan 21)

Summary: In 25 U.S. jurisdictions, decreases in case incidence rate ratios for unvaccinated versus fully vaccinated persons with and without booster vaccine doses were observed when the Omicron variant emerged in December 2021. Protection against infection and death during the Delta-predominant period against infection during Omicron emergence were higher among booster vaccine dose recipients, and especially among persons aged 50–64 and ≥65 years.

**Effectiveness of a Third Dose of mRNA Vaccines Against COVID-19–Associated Emergency Department and Urgent Care Encounters and Hospitalizations Among Adults During Periods of Delta and Omicron Variant Predominance** – (US CDC MMWR, Jan 21)

Summary: Vaccine effectiveness was significantly higher among patients who received their second mRNA COVID-19 vaccine dose <180 days before medical encounters compared with those vaccinated ≥180 days earlier. During both Delta- and Omicron-predominant periods, receipt of a third vaccine dose was highly effective at preventing COVID-19–associated emergency department and urgent care encounters (94% and 82%, respectively) and preventing COVID-19–associated hospitalizations (94% and 90%, respectively).

**Association Between 3 Doses of mRNA COVID-19 Vaccine and Symptomatic Infection Caused by the SARS-CoV-2 Omicron and Delta Variants** – (JAMA, Jan 21)

Summary: The study findings suggest that vaccination with 3 doses of mRNA COVID-19 vaccine, compared with being unvaccinated and with receipt of 2 doses, was associated with protection against both the Omicron and Delta variants, although higher odds ratios for the association with Omicron infection suggest less protection for Omicron than for Delta.

Dear Generations Advantage Member,

As you may know, President Biden’s Administration recently required private health insurers to cover the cost of over-the-counter, at-home COVID-19 tests. To help answer questions you may have as a result of this new rule, we wanted to keep you informed of the types of COVID-19 tests that are currently covered and those that are not currently covered under your Generations Advantage plan. Please note that federally funded programs, like Medicare and Medicare Advantage programs, are not considered “private” health plans and are not subject to the Administration’s recent rules regarding at-home test coverage. Below, you’ll find coverage details for your Generations Advantage plan:

- Over-the-Counter, At-Home Tests: At this time, at-home COVID-19 tests are not a covered benefit. Costs for these tests are also currently not reimbursable through your plan’s Wellness Wallet. Please note that the Biden Administration has

at-home tests to be distributed for free with four free tests per household made available through the US Postal Service. For information on ordering these free tests, you may visit [this website](#).

- COVID-19 Tests Ordered by Your Provider: These tests are a covered benefit if you have COVID-19 symptoms at the time of testing OR if you don't have symptoms but have been exposed to someone infected with the coronavirus. Contact your provider who will determine if you should be tested for COVID-19 and can help you set up a test. You can find a COVID-19 testing site near you by visiting your state's local health department website. NOTE: Testing for employment or travel is not a covered benefit.
- Free Masks KN94, N95- and KN95-Style Masks Now Reimbursable: On January 14, 2022, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommended the use of KN94, N95- or KN95-style masks for the general public as added protection against the spread of the coronavirus. We are expanding our Wellness Wallet reimbursement benefit to include KN94 with a purchase date of 1/1/22 or later, and N95- and KN95-style masks, with a purchase date of 1/14/22 or later.

Continuing to Stay Safe during the Omicron Surge. All are urged to be fully vaccinated and boosted against the COVID-19 virus, as well as to continue to mask and social distance appropriately. To find a COVID-19 vaccine location near you, visit [vaccines.gov](https://vaccines.gov).

## Broadband Committee

To all Vienna Residents,

For nearly three years a small committee of Vienna residents has been pursuing how we might secure broadband internet for Vienna. They have kept the Selectboard informed as the effort develops. The Selectboard supports the efforts of that committee and has authorized and approved this informational mailing.

We in Vienna have a problem ...

Fast, reliable and affordable Internet access (broadband) has become increasingly essential and will only be more so in the future. This was true even before the COVID pandemic which only served to emphasize this.

Broadband is not available in Vienna. Our current choices of Internet access over the phone lines or dish antenna is the best we can get and this is about 1/10th the minimum speed the federal government defines as broadband. Many of our neighboring towns that have cable TV as an option are finding even that is too slow and unreliable for their current and future needs.

Broadband is important for:

- Education - remote classrooms, adult education, job training
- Jobs - working from home/home business
- Remote health - at home consulting with your doctor
- Social - maintaining connections to friends and relatives using video chat programs
- Banking/bill payment - more convenient and less time driving.
- Entertainment - Streaming TV channels, movies, music, games.
- Environment - reducing use of our cars saves us expensive fuel costs and reduces CO2 emissions for a healthier planet.

What are we doing to fix this problem?

Even before the pandemic, we in Vienna and neighboring towns recognized something needed to be done. Forming a coalition with 5 other towns (Mt. Vernon, Leeds, Readfield, Wayne, Fayette) we received state grant money to assess the situation and consider solutions. We examined what similar towns were doing both in Maine and in the rest of the US. It became evident that no private business was going to make the effort to provide affordable broadband in Vienna. There is simply not enough profit for them or it would have been done.

We found that small rural sparsely populated towns like Vienna are taking the initiative to do this themselves. They are building an infrastructure of fiber optic cable to all their residents and then partnering with an Internet service provider to manage that network. The federal government is encouraging this and is providing Maine around 300 million dollars to assist towns by way of infrastructure grants.

## Broadband Committee

Our coalition, the Western Kennebec Lakes Broadband Association, has recently sent out requests to vendors asking them to provide proposals for building and operating a fiber optic network. By the end of January, 2022 we will have proposals from several vendors and will be negotiating with them to find the best solution for Vienna. Once we have firm costs in hand, we will be in the position to apply for the federal grant money. Sparsely populated and unserved towns like Vienna are being given priority for these grant funds. There will remain a cost to the town that would most be likely funded by a municipal bond paid by subscriber fees.

The Selectboard has directed the committee to prepare for and hold a Broadband informational meeting at the Community Building on Tuesday February 15th, 2022 at 7 PM. If you prefer to attend remotely that option will also be available. The link for the remote meeting will be on the Town of Vienna website. Keep your eye on the Town of Vienna website, the Vienna Newsletter and notices around town for more news about the Broadband project

Important voter action on the Broadband project will be on the Warrant at the Town Meeting on March 11 and 12, 2022

### **Neighbors Driving Neighbors Announces Changes in Leadership**

Mt. Vernon, Maine -- Over the past 7 years, three members of the Neighbors Driving Neighbors Board of Directors have led the way: Dan Onion, Sandy Wright, and Shelly Fitzgerald. All three helped launch Neighbors Driving Neighbors (NDN) in 2015 and have been active leaders on the Board ever since. All three, while staying on the Board, are stepping down as officers to make way for new leadership. In the words of NDN's founding President Dan Onion, "After 7 years of starting up, we senior board members are ourselves aging in place, and as much as we'd like to live forever and lead NDN, we must gradually turn the leadership over to a new generation."

That new generation of officers includes Harald Bredesen of Mt. Vernon as President, Peter Roderick of Rome as Vice President, and Kelli Burnham of Fayette as Secretary. Bill Rosenberg of Mt. Vernon will continue as the Treasurer. Ken Elliot of Mt. Vernon was voted in as a new Board member at the NDN Annual Meeting in January. The new officers express their great appreciation to the founding leadership for growing NDN into a valued, volunteer-driven community organization -- even maintaining services through the pandemic. As new NDN President Harald Bredesen, says, "We are glad Dan, Shelly, and Sandy will continue as members of the Board for now to advise the new leadership and staff as we continue to navigate a Covid environment while providing a safe and often critical service."

An additional change at NDN is welcoming Co-Executive Directors, Misty Beck of Fayette and Joe Austin of Farmington. Misty has been NDN's Ride Coordinator since January 2021 and is excited to move into a new, collaborative leadership position.

Joe Austin is a native of Franklin County and spent the bulk of his career working in Student Affairs at USM and most recently at University of Maine at Farmington. Joe remains active in the career development field and is currently serving as President of the Maine Career Development Association. He holds a master's degree in counseling from the University of Maine.

Misty earned her PhD in English from Washington University in St. Louis in 2001, before moving to Maine in 2006. She currently teaches courses in writing and environmental humanities at the University of Maine at Farmington. As a resident of Fayette, she has served as President of the Basin-David-Tilton Ponds Association and Vice President of the Friends of Starling Hall, and she is currently a volunteer member of the Vienna Union Hall Association.
